Even though I was just an exchange student, I felt like I was a regular student of Waseda because I was in there for 1 year. I could experience all the weather, all the season. I left Tokyo only 3 days ago, but already miss so much. It's my honor to share what I learned, felt, and recognized.

1. Classes

As my major is related to international relations, I wanted to know the perspective Japan has toward the world, politically and economically. Fortunately, I could find lots of classes that addressed international issues in terms of Japan's position. Here's the list I took related to what I said: Contemporary Japanese Foreign Policy, Postwar Japan-US Relations, International Relations of Japan, Japanese Political Thought A. Among these, what I recommend is Japanese Political Thought A. Actually this is not a Taisi course but open course, so anyone can enjoy this class. Through this class I could find some issues I've never heard before like Iwakura embassy, Karayuki-san, and more. As a foreigner what I focused on was just related to what Japan achieved and failed or what rulers planned. Therefore it was good to see lower classes' life and what made them to think like that. Also it was interesting how that lower classes and intellectuals shaped the empire.



By the way, I took not only the classes about politics but also about Japanese culture. I hope every exchange students take these courses: Bon dance and Urban history of Tokyo. Bon dance is Japanese traditional folk dance. It's very simple so once you get used to it you can enjoy Japanese dance festival – Bon Odori. When I participated in my town's Bon Odori

festival, I really enjoyed and this experience became my unforgettable memory. Urban history of Tokyo is not just a class, it's a tour around Tokyo area! Through this course I could deeply understand the narratives the area had as the professor explained very kindly. We the class walked for 2 hours so if you have in mind to take this course, you need to prepare for hard walking. Here's the list the class visited for this semester: Waseda, Kagurazaka, Idabashi, Nihonbashi, Ochanomizu, Marunouchi, Ginza, Tsukiji.

4. Travelling
